Keynote Address - Sarah Buel is a national leader in the fight against domestic violence and helped create the Violence Against Women Act in 1994. As a student at Harvard Law, she founded the Harvard Women's Advocacy Project, the Harvard Women's Prison Project and the Harvard Children and Family Rights Project. She was a prosecutor in Massachusetts where she established awardwinning domestic violence and juvenile programs. Now, she is Clinical Professor of Law at the University of Texas where she heads a domestic violence clinic.
