


Duke Law students are in high demand because they are known as leaders, clear thinkers, and excellent writers who are ready to serve as effective advocates from their first day on the job. They also do real legal work. **By the time they** graduate, they may have*:

Represented a technology startup in preparation for seed funding, drafting customer contracts and employee agreements and helping navigate securities regulations and FDA registration

Argued and won before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 3rd Circuit, having researched and briefed the court on an evidentiary hearing on claims of actual innocence for client serving life without parole

Appeared before a Social Security Administration judge, handling opening argument and direct and cross-examination and winning thousands of dollars in unpaid disability benefits for client

Drafted and amended bylaws, articles of incorporation, and a development agreement for an upcoming project in collaboration with founder of non-profit organization specializing in developing affordable housing

Devised regulatory and fiscal framework adopted by the state for new requirement that childcare centers and pre-K programs test for and remove lead from drinking and cooking water

*Examples of work done by students in Duke Law clinics in last two years. More than 60% of students complete a clinic or externship while at Duke.
